










## The cost of healthy food is the primary reason parents say offering healthy food to their family is challenging



Methodology: 1,000 interviews among adults age 18+ were conducted from April 5-9, 2024, using an online survey. The results were weighted to ensure proportional responses. The Bayesian confidence interval for 1,000 interviews is 3.5, which is roughly equivalent to a margin of error of ±3.1 at the 95% confidence level.

Totals may not add up to 100% due to rounding.
